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# Hidden Gems of Portugal & Spain: Alentejo & Extremadura

Dear Members and Friends of The Metropolitan Museum of Art,

The peaceful landscapes of the Iberian Peninsula belie their passionate history of ancient invaders, crusading knights, and intrepid explorers. On this unique journey to lesser-known towns in the Alentejo region of Portugal and her Spanish neighbor, Extremadura, hilltop fortresses, medieval villages, classical ruins, and ornate palaces will reveal diverse cultural influences, from Celtic to Roman to Moorish to French.

Begin in Lisbon, which beguiles with its elegant palaces and characteristic Manueline architecture. Continue to Alentejo, known as the country's bread basket, traveling through olive groves, vineyards, and cork forests dotted with castle towns. With special access, admire rarely seen frescoes, savor local wines and olive oils, and stay in stunning hotels.

Crossing the border into Spain, the "World Heritage Triangle" of Mérida, Cáceres, and Guadalupe offers well-preserved Roman ruins, storybook castles, and regal palaces. View the impressive collections of the Palacio de los Golfines de Abajo in Cáceres, where we will also enjoy two-starred Michelin cuisine and stay in a historic *parador*.

I am delighted to be leading this exceptional program for The Met. Please join me as we explore the common heritage of two regions that are rarely combined in one itinerary.

Ronda Kasl is Curator of Latin American Art in the American Wing at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, where she oversees the growth of a new collection area and the planning of related exhibitions. As a specialist in the art of Spain and Spanish America, she lectures widely and is the author of numerous books and articles, including *Sacred Spain: Art and Belief in the Spanish World* (2009) and *The Making of Hispano-Flemish Style: Art, Commerce and Politics in Fifteenth-Century Castile* (2014). Dr. Kasl holds degrees in art and art history from the University of Tulsa and the Institute of Fine Arts, New York University.

- Discover Lisbon's cultural treasures, including the National Museum of Ancient Art and the Gulbenkian Museum, on guided visits
- Tour lesser-known UNESCO World Heritage Sites including Évora and Elvas in Portugal and the "World Heritage Triangle" of Mérida, Cáceres, and Guadalupe in Spain
- Discover megalithic sites and Moorish strongholds in Alentejo, admire spectacular views from forgotten hilltop towns, and enjoy a private lunch at a vineyard with its owner
- Marvel at the collections in Cáceres' Palacio de los Golfines de Abajo on a private visit
- View the altarpiece by Zurbarán *in situ* at the Church of the Candelaria in Zafra

### U.S. Departure

Wednesday, September 20

Depart the U.S. on an overnight flight to Lisbon.

### Lisbon, Portugal

Thursday, September 21

Arrive in Lisbon and transfer to the impressive Pousada de Lisboa, where rooms are reserved for early arrival. In the afternoon, discover the outstanding Tile Museum in the Madre de Deus Convent, renowned for its blue-and-white glazed panels; and the Gulbenkian Museum, a meticulously curated collection of masterpieces brought from the Hermitage in the 1920s. Gather for a welcome dinner. D

### Lisbon

Friday, September 22

Drive along the Tagus river to the Jerónimos Monastery, whose elaborate maritime motifs make it a stunning example of Manueline architecture. Lunch is at the Champalimaud Centre for the Unknown, a state-of-the-art medical research facility overlooking the spot where the great Portuguese navigators set sail. At the National Museum of Ancient Art, highlights include paintings by Hieronymus Bosch, Albrecht Dürer, and other European masters, as well as the Belém Monstrance, wrought from gold brought home by Vasco da Gama. The balance of the day is at leisure, perhaps to ride a *tuk-tuk* to the hilltop Castelo de São Jorge, or visit the newly opened Museum of Art, Architecture and Technology. This evening, you may wish to experience a performance of *fado*, a powerfully emotional style of Portuguese music. B, L

### Lisbon / Évora, Portugal

Saturday, September 23

Depart for the Alentejo countryside, known as the nation's bread basket for its bounty of breads, cheeses, smoked meats, olive oils, and wines. Inside the medieval walls of Évora, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, discover a 2nd-century Roman temple dedicated to Diana and the shocking Bones Chapel. Check into Convento do Espinheiro Hotel & Spa, a former monastery, for three nights. B, L, D

### Alentejo, Portugal

Sunday, September 24–Monday, September 25

Discover Viana do Alentejo, Vila Nova de Baronia, Alvito, and other less-visited small towns that are home to hidden frescoes inaccessible to the general public. At the wine-producing estate of Quinta Dona Maria, enjoy a private visit and lunch with the owner in this palatial 18th-century home. Portugal is the world's largest producer of cork, and we will walk through a forest of cork trees to marvel at the Almendres Megalithic Site, dating to the 6th millennium B.C. Spend a

morning amid the white-walled streets of medieval Monsaraz. A tour of this hilltop village's Old Town includes a performance of traditional *Cante Alentejano* singing. Enjoy a late afternoon Alentejo wine, cheese, and olive oil tasting, including the hotel's own oil made from the harvest of its orchards. 2B, 2L

### Évora / Cáceres, Spain

Tuesday, September 26

Drive to Elvas, a spectacular, UNESCO-listed garrison town surrounded by massive star-shaped fortifications. Cross the border into Spanish Extremadura for lunch at Atrio, a two-star Michelin restaurant in Cáceres, birthplace of many famous Spanish conquistadors. On a guided city tour, see vestiges of Roman, Arab, Jewish, and Christian settlements. A private visit is planned to the Palacio de los Golfines de Abajo, to see its splendid European art collection. Check into the Palacio de Oquendo for two nights. B, L, D

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## Guadalupe / Trujillo, Spain

Wednesday, September 27

At the magnificent Royal Monastery of Santa María, home of the famous *Virgin of Guadalupe*, discover six centuries of architectural styles and important paintings by Francisco de Zurbarán. Continue to Trujillo and walk through Plaza Mayor, one of Spain's most spectacular plazas. See the city's storybook 10th-century Moorish castle and 13th-century Santa María La Mayor Church, whose altarpiece stuns with 25 brilliantly colored 15th-century Flemish-style paintings. B, L

## Mérida / Zafra, Spain

Thursday, September 28

On an archaeological tour of UNESCO-listed Mérida, capital of Extremadura, see the well-conserved Roman theater. Visit the Rafael Moneo-designed National Museum of Roman Art, which has one of the best collections of mosaics and mural paintings in Europe. Continue south to the gleaming white town of Zafra for a two-night stay. B, D

## Zafra

Friday, September 29

Discover Zafra, an important meeting place for artisan guilds and social and religious institutions throughout the centuries. Stroll the porticoed Plaza Grande, surrounded by 15th-century buildings, and admire the Zurbarán altarpiece at the 16th-century Church of the Candelaria. Tonight's festive farewell dinner is at a local winery. B, D

## Seville, Spain / U.S. Return

Saturday, September 30

Depart for the nearby Seville airport and the flights home. B
